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

Frankfort Audubon Society has several opportunities to help you participate. All events are free and open to the general public.

- On Thursday February 11, 6:30pm at Paul Sawyier library (319 Wapping Street) Hannah Helm will present information about our declining songbird populations and what people can do. This will include awareness of hazards facing birds and how to make yards more bird friendly, with proper houses, feeders and water. She will also introduce the Great Backyard Bird Count.
- On Saturday, February 13, 9am at the Picnic Shelter just outside Salato, at the Fish and Wildlife Headquarters (#1 Sportsmans Lane) a Frankfort Audubon member will conduct a bird walk around the lake or Habitrek Trail. If the weather is cold there may some migrant ducks in the lake. This walk will last till around 11.
- On Sunday, February 14, 9am at the wetland parking lot at Cove Spring Park on highway 127, a Frankfort Audubon member will conduct a bird walk around the wetland. This is a good spot to look for wintering sparrows. This walk will last till around 11.

GBBC Checklists may be submitted at http://birdcount.org or eBird may also be used submit observations from a smartphone or tablet. eBird is now a free app on both the Android smartphones or iPhone, just search for eBird in the Google Play Store or Apple App Store.

Frankfort Christmas Bird Count Results. Peggy Gould, CBC coordinator, reported that we had 21 participants this year! AWESOME! Congrats to Barb Cornett of Life Adventure Center at Buckley Wildlife Sanctuary for hosting over half of those birders. On Saturday, December 19th, we had a total of 3,669 individuals of 64 different species in 422 hours of effort. The most common bird was the European Starling, but included a Bald Eagle, Sandhill Cranes, a late Spotted Sandpiper, and a Red-breasted Nuthatch. Also 6

Bird News:

PROVIDING WATER FOR BIRDS IN WINTER by Hannah Helm.

Many of us like to feed birds in winter, but did you know that fresh water may be even more important? Just like us birds need to drink water. When the weather gets below freezing, many usual water sources freeze over and birds waste energy searching for fresh water. You can help through the use of a bird bath deicer or heater. A deicer can be purchased for under \$25, but will not work in really cold temps. Heaters can be an entire unit that holds water or as a device that can be placed in an existing bird bath. There are even models that clip to a deck. They can be found locally, but the most variety is found online. Although a heater is the most carefree method of helping birds, you can also just put out fresh water several times a day. I also add a heated rock which helps keep the water unfrozen a little longer. So help our birds through winter,



not all birds eat seeds, but they ALL need fresh water. I have been excited to see a Yellow-rumped Warbler at mine this winter!
